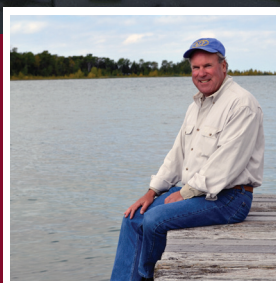

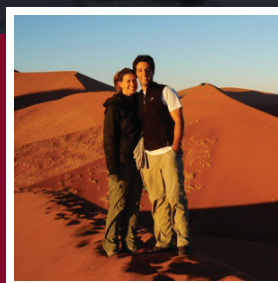

Wiseman's Curiosity Leads to Unique Designs

W. Kenneth Wiseman '71 isn't the type to let the grass grow under his feet. His ability to blend an innate inquisitiveness with a confidence in finding solutions has resulted in a career the likes of which few architects can match. Designs for sports, science, technology, health, education, civic, cultural, federal and commercial structures have resulted in a portfolio that includes multiple LEED Platinum buildings and led to him being named to The American Institute of Architects' College of Fellows.

Shortly before he finished his master's degree at The Ohio State University in 1978, Wiseman was hired by the prestigious architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill. He was placed in the Denver office, where he began his career designing large projects including an entire block of downtown Edmonton, Alberta, Canada which involved three high-rise buildings.

"I was literally less than a year out of school," he said. "We had probably 20 young architects in the office, and we all had a block of some downtown somewhere. We all had to help each other because these were huge projects. It was a lot of work but a great education from a practice standpoint."

One of his clients was the Air Force Academy, 70 miles south in Colorado Springs.

"In the world of the military, they have master plans," said Wiseman, who became the first Associate Partner in the company under the age of 30. "I did the land use plan for the base. They didn't have one when I started. It's almost like writing the zoning for a city but in this case for a 17,000 acre installation. Then I did a master plan for the cadet area, the community center, the airfield and logistics supply areas, and housing. You could think of it as a book with multiple chapters or a series of volumes, to help them organize and control how the facilities were built there."

When the Denver office closed, Wiseman moved to the Washington, D.C. office but continued to travel to Colorado to work on projects at the Air Force Academy.

In the early 1990s he was at the Air Force Academy and a meeting in the middle of the day canceled. So Wiseman decided to pass the extra time in downtown Colorado Springs and he came across a brochure for the Olympic Training Center. The Olympic Training Center was only a few minutes away so he stopped by ... and ended up redesigning it.

"I walked around and eventually asked someone who was in charge of facilities. I got the name, knocked on his door, asked if they were thinking of doing anything and was told they'd been talking about doing a master plan," said Wiseman. "Within a month I got a proposal to do a master plan and, luckily enough, got the job."

Wiseman designed a new visitor center, an Olympic-sized pool, a second gymnasium, and a new athlete dormitory with a connected dining hall in addition to an impressive "Olympic Path" at the facility, which had been ENT Air Force Base prior to the USOC taking ownership in 1978.

"I walked around and eventually asked someone who was in charge of facilities. I got the name, knocked on his door, asked if they were thinking of doing anything and was told they'd been talking about doing a master plan. Within a month I got a proposal to do a master plan and, luckily enough, got the job."

He also led the design of the 150-acre U.S. Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif. (now called the Chula Vista Elite Athlete Training Center), followed by the U.S. Sailing Center in Miami.

"I tend to gravitate towards buildings that have people using them that have real needs, not just speculative office buildings," Wiseman said. "Programmatically challenging buildings is what I have done most over my career, and in unique places. I love working on campuses or institutions like the Federal Reserve or with the Veteran's Administration. Gosh, who wouldn't want to help veterans?"

"The Air Force Academy is a unique place ... you don't do a Spanish ranch building in the middle of the Air Force Academy. It's got to be an Air Force Academy building. The Olympic committee falls right in that category. You've got 40 sports with tiny people and gigantic people and people from every country and background. So that's really what has set the tone for the rest of my career."

The training center undertakings led to more sports facility projects and planning, including sitting on the design and planning committee for the London Olympic Bid Committee for the 2012 Olympic Games in addition to designing the field hockey venue for the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Ga., several venues for the 2015 Pan American Games in Toronto, and the award-winning Speed Skating Oval in the city of Richmond, British Columbia for the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, Canada.

"When you design a building for the Olympics you actually do three buildings," he said. "You do the one for before the Games so the home team and others can use it and try it out, and during the Games it's all locked down and buttoned up with television and all of that stuff and then after the Games for community use."

Wiseman flipped the traditional approach to creating Olympic venues with the Richmond Olympic Oval, intentionally starting at the end by configuring it for post-Olympic use. The Richmond Olympic Oval received the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada's (RAIC) 2010 Award for Innovation in Architecture, the highest honor bestowed by the RAIC. It was also listed as one of the 50 most influential sports buildings of the last century, and the only one in North America, by the International Association for Sports and Leisure Facilities.

"Every oval before that ended up being a white elephant. It didn't matter where it was, they ended up being buildings that were subsidized by the community that built them because they were so big and unusual," said Wiseman. "So, we designed something that was going to be able to take care of itself financially and programmatically serve a big region and then we put a speed skating oval in it. It was a very unique thought process and we ended up with a really unique building."

Wiseman doesn't seem to take any project for granted, viewing himself as lucky to have had the opportunity to create different and useful facilities for a variety of clients in more than 30 states.

"In architecture—and I think it's true in painting or sculpting also—it's the

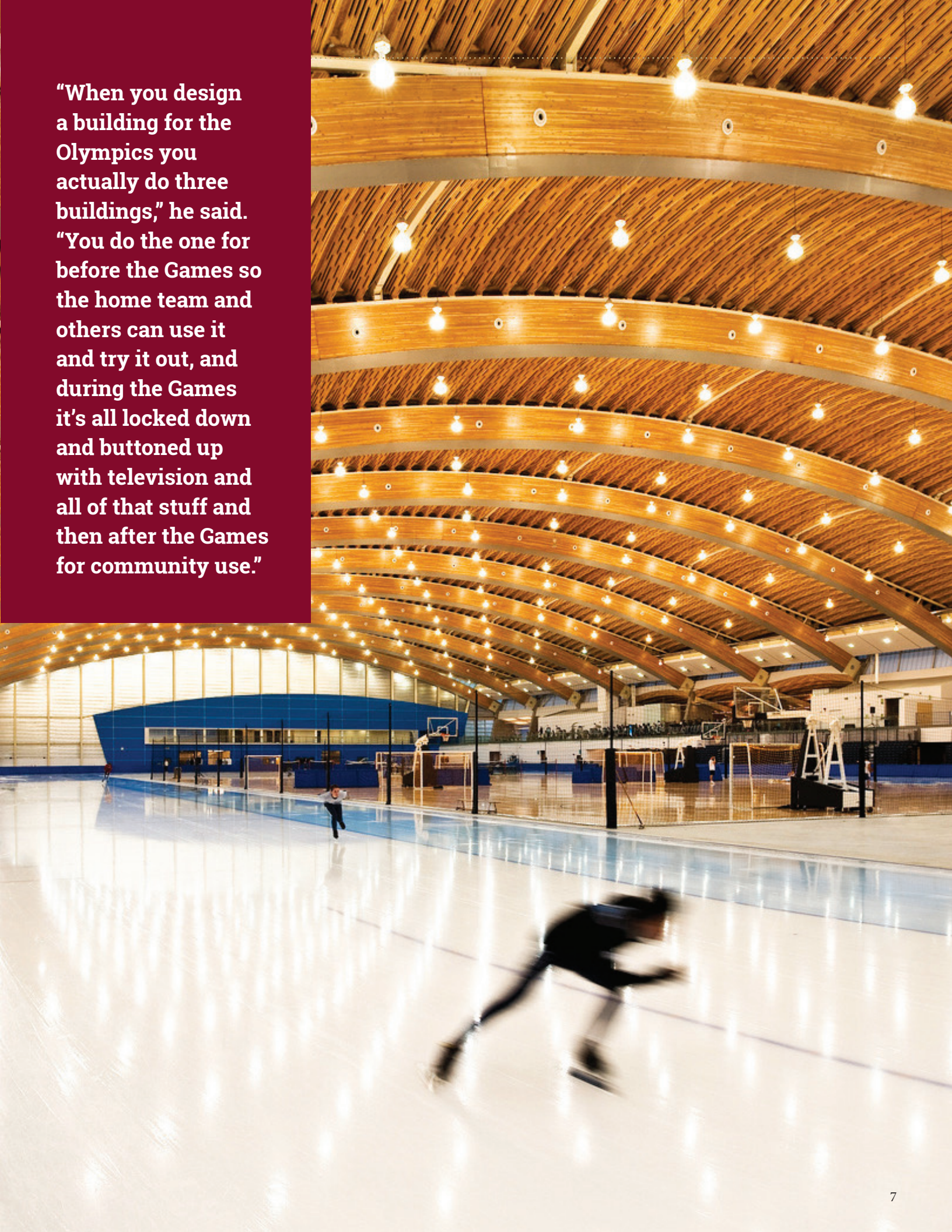
boundaries that are inherent in what you're doing. There's always a financial budget, an energy budget, a sustainable goal," he said. "You want it to be a healthy place and there are also functional demands. A gym is a gym. You can't make it round."

One of Wiseman's hobbies is baking and he uses it as an analogy to convey the architectural process.

"In baking there's a list of ingredients like flour, eggs, baking powder," he said. "But how you mix the butter and the eggs and the flour and for how long and how fast or slow brings out certain attributes to make it successful. The same is true in architecture in that once you get the ingredients together, the pressures or constraints from those are usually what inspires you. That's where the inspiration comes from, along with the site or place. Working in rural Mississippi is very different from the foothills of Colorado Springs or suburban Fort Worth at Texas Christian University. The sun, the air, everything is different. The place, the geography, the nature of the building, the program and the people are what inspires me in the kind of work I like to do."

He said he has always gravitated towards unique places and, with that, projects that had to work for the people who would eventually use those locations.

"When you design a building for the Olympics you actually do three buildings," he said. "It's not about my ego and what I think people should do, but about helping and making nice places for people to live and be happy and I think that starts at a place like Watterson. I couldn't name you one person, it's the whole package from the Monsignor to the good sisters to the teachers," he said.

"Watterson had a real impact on shaping me as a person as an educated, hard-working, curious chap," he said. "All of the teachers encouraged my inquisitiveness. They weren't so rigid in their pedagogy or their lesson plans that if I asked a question that was a little askew, which I tend to do, they would then let me run with it. That's kind of an essential skill as an architect. I didn't know it at the time but it served me well."

Wiseman paid his own way through Bishop Watterson, working a paper route and then as a senior, working in construction. While he played football at BWHS and was recruited to play at Ohio Dominican, he decided not to play in college and continued working in construction while in school at Ohio Dominican. After two years there he applied for a scholarship to the architecture program at The Ohio State University and he got it.

"The good Lord was looking out for me," he said. "It was an ad in the classified section of the newspaper that couldn't have been more than an inch wide and deep and I was the only one who applied."

The combination of Wiseman's skills and work ethic led to his elevation to fellowship in The American Institute of Architects in 2020, an achievement reached by just two percent of architects. Because of the pandemic, the fellowship was awarded in 2021 at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. which allowed for his entire family to be there

—his wife Lori and children Stephanie, John and Katie.

"To stand on the stage at the Kennedy Center was like, you've got to be kidding me!" Wiseman said. "I'm a pipsqueak compared to all of the people who have been on that stage. It was a great experience."

Wiseman was inducted into the BWHS Performing and Visual Arts Hall of Fame in 2021 (see page 24) and was named a 2010 Distinguished Alumni of The Ohio State University.

Additionally, he has taught or lectured at more than two dozen universities and served on a Federal Access Board committee to determine Americans with Disabilities Act design standards.

"It was a large committee and we wrote all of the rules and regulations to make buildings accessible in America, about 30 years ago," said Wiseman. "I got that opportunity through working with Paralympians. When I was designing the Olympic facilities, I didn't just talk to able-bodied Olympians. I talked to Paralympians, too."

He also has an environmental awareness that goes back to his days working construction. At this point Wiseman has designed five LEEDS Platinum buildings, the highest rating possible, which reflects efforts to reduce waste during construction and energy usage during construction and beyond, while incorporating sustainability.

"I've been aware of the environmental impact of buildings since the day I started work," he said. "I've also evolved along with the awareness in society."

When his son was at Eckerd College, Wiseman designed the James Center for Molecular and Life Sciences building and found a way to cool the building using the gray water from a sewage treatment plant next door. Normally the gray water would be sold or used to irrigate parks, gardens and in other non-potable ways. Instead of putting cooling towers that would need replaced every five years, Wiseman and his staff used a pipe and a pump to borrow the cool 70 degree water and send it back at 73 degrees.

“Not only did we get free energy but also huge maintenance savings on the building over time,” said Wiseman. “We used something already there, which is very sustainable. What’s nice about working with colleges and universities is, if the administration isn’t demanding sustainable buildings then the students are and we have to react to them.”

He is currently designing his 20th building at Texas Christian University, for freshman housing.

“Being a freshman in college now is so radically different than it was when most dorms were built,” said Wiseman. “It’s interesting how you’re trying to give young people a place to live that helps them be successful in school. It’s not just a place to decorate and hang out. The aspiration is this is a part of the whole social experience of a university. How do you design a place that’s unique to freshmen and supporting their success? That’s the mindset. That’s just fun.

“That’s why I do what I do.”

Wooley's Love of Outdoors Led to Career with USFWS

Charlie Wooley '73 began his career picking up trash at Delaware State Park and now his work with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) involves helping to keep our ecosystem in balance in the midwest.

"My friend Jim Kurth and I started as low as you can get and to this day I always appreciate a clean restroom when I go into a state or national park," said Wooley.

Msgr. Kenneth Grimes, who served as principal at Bishop Watterson from 1972-76, was chaplain at the Ohio Statehouse and he made the connection for Wooley and Kurth to start working at Delaware State Park.

"The natural resource field is a very competitive field and during our first year in college Jim and I were told to get experience," Wooley said. "We were thrilled and Fr. Grimes gave us the first step in what turned out to be professional careers for both of us. That was a long time ago and the days of filling jobs in that way are gone."

Wooley is the oldest of five siblings that graduated from Bishop Watterson (Chris '75, Lucia '74, Kevin '78 and Steve '83). It was his experience spending time with his family in nature that led him to major in biology at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

"When I was growing up in Columbus, my dad would take us to the west side to Big and Little Darby Creeks just to go fishing and I loved walking in the creek, turning over rocks, and picking up crayfish. If we caught something, fine, but just spending time exploring with my father and brothers was the best part," he said. "During the college years I worked summer jobs for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and I really enjoyed it so I started full time when I graduated."

Wooley began as a fishery biologist with the USFWS and has held the positions

of field supervisor, program analyst, assistant regional director, and deputy regional director prior to his current role as Regional Director, Midwest Region. He spent time in Alaska, Florida and in the Chesapeake Bay area studying what was happening with various fish species including Alaskan salmon streams, striped bass and sturgeon in Florida and striped bass in the Chesapeake Bay.

"It was just wonderful to be outside in all three of those environments doing sampling and studying fish species," said Wooley. "We had to figure out why those species were declining and implement programs to help them recover from the declines they were facing."

Wooley is the author of 15 technical papers on the biology and life history of the striped bass, sturgeon and ecosystem restoration. He has been recognized for his work with the 2001 Meritorious Service Award and 2012 Distinguished Service Award from the Department of Interior, the 2014 Ira Gabrielson Leadership Award from the USFWS, and the 2017 Conservation Leader Award from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point College of Natural Resources. In addition, he was named one of the 10 Unusually Outstanding Employees by the Director of the USFWS in 1989 and 1992. The award that is most meaningful to Wooley, however, is the 2022 George Bird Grinnell Memorial Award for Distinguished Service to Natural Resource Conservation, presented by the Wildlife Management Institute.

"This award is special to me because it is from a professional organization of biologists and scientists, not from people I work with, supervise or manage," he said.

Wooley described his career in two phases.

"The first half of my career I was taking care of fish, and the other half of my career has been taking care of people," said Wooley, who oversees a staff of 1,000 as well as their programs and projects.

"During the pandemic, it was important to focus on making sure they have a safe environment to work in, being respectful to people with children at home, being respectful to schedules and being respectful to those with elderly parents," he said.

If the employees Wooley is responsible for like his management style, they have his experience at Bishop Watterson to credit. Wooley said being respectful of others and the benefits of teamwork were ingrained in him at Bishop Watterson.

"The respect of others was instilled in the whole Watterson experience," he said. "We had a really good group of teachers who were highly trained and respectful to us as students and I, in turn, learned respect of others who were older."

He said being a co-captain of the BWHS football team that won the 1972 state championship had a lifelong impact on him as well.

"I just really appreciated the good coaches at Watterson for both basketball and football who taught us the concept of team," Wooley said. "It was a wonderful experience to be a part of a group that came together to set their goals and came together to be successful. I've always had respect for the coaches who provided the guidance for us and provided teammates that could be lifelong friends."

Wooley, and Kurth '73, his state park latrine cleaning buddy, have been friends since they were in third grade together at St. Andrew. Kevin Spillers '73, who played on the football team with Wooley and

Kurth, became not only a friend but family.

"He was one of my good friends," Wooley said. "And then he discovered my sister and spent more time with her and then married her!"

Wooley's own immediate family includes his wife, Julie, who he met in college, and their daughters, Sarah and Laura. He is now excited to be sharing his love of the outdoors with his granddaughter, Kendall, who he had outfitted with her own tiny life vest to go fishing on a boat in June when she was four months old.

Wooley's love of the outdoors and drive to help struggling species isn't limited to the United States. While working for USFWS sounds like a job focused only on the U.S., his expertise has enabled him to work with scientists from Russia, Ukraine and China, both in those countries and here in the U.S., and he has a strong regard for these international connections.

"That has been a wonderful experience, and unique, to be able to go to Russia and China to learn about their efforts with the preservation of fish species," said Wooley, who mentioned that he is saddened by the current war in Ukraine.

"I've actually been to two of the cities in Ukraine that have been attacked, Odessa and Kherson," he said. "These are beautiful places with hardworking people and knowing the suffering the people are going through is heartbreaking."

Wooley has found the exchange with the foreign scientists to be beneficial for everyone involved.

"You learn about the world and you see what a special place the U.S. is in regard to the efforts we have toward clean water

and clean air to breathe. It really grounds you and gives you a sense of purpose and appreciation. It makes you a better human being to experience some of the things these other countries don't have," Wooley said. "I learned the value of clear communications, the value of other scientists not having the same monetary resources. But I'm always impressed at how they can improvise and how they could still be successful at restoring a fish or wildlife. I have respect for their resourcefulness and tremendous amount of willpower. In the United States, we have a tendency to rely on technology and with these other countries I saw people who rely on common sense, hard work and ingenuity."

In his position as Regional Director for the Midwest, Wooley applies his appreciation for the resources at the disposal of the USFWS daily. One of the areas under his watch is the Lake Erie wetlands, an area that impacts the health of Ohio fish, wildlife and waterways.

"The Great Lakes, including Lake Erie, represent the world's largest freshwater system and the nation's fourth longest coastal area. The value of wetlands, to wildlife and to humans, is almost incalculable," he said. "In general, bogs, marshes, swamps, and other wetland areas clean and purify water, making it drinkable. Wetlands, like those in coastal areas of the Great Lakes, also slow down floodwaters, help stop erosion on beaches,

and they make local weather patterns less extreme. Wetlands provide important nutrients and habitat for many different kinds of aquatic animals and help ensure the healthy waterways."

Wooley explained why conserving the biodiversity of the U.S. is important to the average American.

"No one knows how the extinction of organisms will affect the other members of its ecosystem, but the removal of a single species can set off a chain reaction affecting many others," Wooley said.

"Species that may be affected could be of medicinal, economic or ecological value. When we lose a species to extinction, we may be losing solutions to our most pressing problems. For example, more than a quarter of all prescriptions written annually in the United States contain chemicals discovered in plants and animals. If these organisms had been destroyed before their unique chemistries were known, their secrets would have died with them.

"Whether we're conserving pollinator habitat, tracking contaminants in the Great Lakes or partnering with states, tribes and other countries to conserve our natural heritage, our work reflects our commitment to conserve the resources entrusted to us by the American people."

Swartz Leads Start of Daughters of Isabella

Donna (Paquette '77) Swartz is taking things one step at a time as she leads a group of women bringing a new ministry to St. Agatha and the Diocese of Columbus, the Daughters of Isabella.

The Daughters of Isabella is a Catholic women's organization with circles throughout the United States and Canada. The new local circle is just the sixth to be chartered in the state of Ohio.

During the early days of the pandemic in 2020, a young woman who moved to Columbus to be closer to family joined St. Agatha parish and suggested the idea of starting a Daughters of Isabella circle. She got the ball rolling with the international organization and Swartz stepped into the role of Regent, the equivalent of the Grand Knight of a Knights of Columbus local council.

"I felt like it had been a long time since our parish had a women's ministry," said Swartz. "I felt like we really need something and I want to be a part of this. At the meeting when I was asked to take it on I felt like, oh no, can I do this? But all of these women really needed this, too, especially in the world we have today."

The organization was founded in New Haven, Conn. in 1897 under the patronage of Queen Isabella of Spain, also known as Isabella the Catholic, who funded Christopher Columbus' voyage that landed in North America. The motto of Daughters of Isabella is "Unity, Friendship, Charity."

"All three aspects are so attractive to me: spiritually for sure, socially, and then to help others in charity," said Swartz. "We need all three of these and the women that are getting involved need and want this."

The group needed 35 members with 11 willing to take on officer roles and everything fell in place and the Our Lady of the Rosary circle was chartered in March 2022, the first ever chartered via Zoom.

"It was wonderful," said Swartz. "The international organizer and officers were extremely supportive to help us become a chartered circle. It didn't feel like we were starting from scratch."

They have been having monthly meetings and hosted a wine and cheese social attended by their chaplain and St. Agatha pastor Fr. Mark Summers and his mother.

Spiritually the group has been participating in the Vocations Crucifix Program. Each month a member takes a standing crucifix home, agreeing to pray daily for religious and priestly vocations.

They have sponsored a sneaker drive and fundraiser for the GotSneakers? organization to recycle and reuse sneakers, keeping them out of landfills.

HADAD WORKING TO REDUCE FOOD WASTE

Dominique Hadad '16 could never have predicted that science teacher **Will Reiss's** influence on her interest in recycling would lead to an aversion to carrot cake, but it happened!



Hadad discovered a passion for helping the earth while assisting Mr. Reiss in encouraging recycling at Bishop Watterson when she served as Student Council President during her senior year. Mr. Reiss, who has since passed away, was always known for his kindness, but even more so for his concern for the environment.

“Mr. Reiss was very passionate about making the school more green, so that’s how we used our class funds. That exposed me to how much I cared about making green transitions for organizations,” Hadad reflected.

In 2020 Hadad won The Ohio State University President’s Prize, which is a grant of \$100,000 to fund a project for a year. Her project is a business called Green Scope. As the name suggests, Green Scope is geared towards sustainability and helping the environment.

When reflecting on what led her to creating Green Scope, Hadad said her experiences at Bishop Watterson were particularly influential, especially serving as Student Council President.

“It gave me a lot of experience working on a team and leading a team,” Hadad said. “Managing different peoples’ different personalities, their time commitments. I don’t even think I realized in the moment how much it was teaching me. Leadership skills are definitely something I took away from my time at Watterson.”

After her positive experiences with leadership in high school, Hadad then participated in the Student Government programs at The Ohio State University, eventually becoming the Director of Sustainability, which led to the OSU prize and creation of Green Scope.

Green Scope’s mission is to bring sustainability to local businesses by helping locally-owned restaurants reduce food waste. Hadad saw the issues of food waste and food insecurity and was inspired to find a way to support businesses that were striving to be more green.

“We have three main focuses. We make sure that food gets put to good use, we put money back into local organizations, and we keep waste from our landfills. I’m interested in food because there is a food waste issue. One out of every three plates of food is wasted. A third of our food chain is not even being utilized,” said Hadad. “And on the other hand, people are hungry. Food insecurity is a huge issue. One in four students at The Ohio State University alone is food insecure. We have problems on both ends of the spectrum—we have too much, and yet we don’t have enough.”

Through Green Scope Hadad outsources sustainability experts to help local businesses reduce their waste and be greener. Green Scope currently works with 10-15 businesses and is still enrolling more.

“Three-fourths of customers are willing to pay more for green businesses,” Hadad said. “The idea that businesses can charge more, make more money, is pretty huge.”

Looking for answers to the complex problem of concurrent food waste and food insecurity, Hadad and her team conducted waste studies at food businesses to help local restaurants understand and reduce their food waste, and help Green Scope understand the problem.

“We would go through their trash after a day or a week, depending on the business. We’d sort it and study it and give them analytics,” Hadad explained.

After working with food pantries, Hadad learned that they have to throw away about 400 pounds of food every week—adding up to about 25,000 pounds every year. A lot of this waste was food that the pantry simply couldn’t use—food that was donated by grocery stores but had gone bad, or that was given to them in too high of quantities.

“One pantry had 600 pounds of baby carrots that they couldn’t use fast enough,” Hadad recalled. “My teammates and I took as much as we could, and then I made, like, three carrot cakes. Then I *hated* carrot cake.”

UNEARTH THE WORLD: Connecting the World through Service

Kathryn Conrad Pisco, a 2001 graduate of Bishop Watterson, always loved the community service aspect tied into her Catholic high school experience.

“Having that be a part of the curriculum and the norm when I was in high school really informed how I look at things as an adult,” Kathryn said.

So when she and her husband Mike decided to take a year-long sabbatical in 2013 and travel the world before settling down and starting a family, they were inspired to complete five volunteer projects during their trip.



“We visited 20 countries on that trip,” Kathryn said. “The true highlight was the different locations to do volunteer projects. It was a really transformative experience. I always had been proud of the fact I followed the conventional path of going to college and getting a job. But it pushed me out of my comfort zone and made me want to focus my work on making the world better in some way.”

After the trip, Kathryn left behind the sales and training career she had after graduating from Cornell University and created Uneath the World, a social impact company that helps pair high school students, college students, families and professionals with grassroots global nonprofits to do meaningful volunteer work.

“A couple things struck me and Mike while we were planning our trip,” she said. “It’s hard to find projects, and it was also really expensive. And there was no real training to prepare you. We used agencies to help place us. A lot of times these international projects are more for the volunteer than the community—something they can put on their resume. We were so inspired that we started a business to help some of those problems and build some amazing relationships.”

Kathryn and Mike spent time researching nonprofits with a real need they could partner with and create quality relationships. They landed upon five partnerships, mainly

in Central and South America.

If people were interested in a volunteer experience and inquired with Uneath the World, participants would fill out a questionnaire so Kathryn could learn their skills and interests. She would act as the liaison to get them placed in a project. And the trip itself wasn’t the only piece—education was a large part of the equation.

“One thing important to Mike and me was the education piece,” Kathryn said. “We had a pre-trip curriculum and post-trip coaching. People would struggle when they got home to fit their experience into their own life. The coaching was a cool part of making sure we built on that experience.”

Each year, Kathryn and Mike worked with around 150 volunteers through Uneath the World. One example of how their pairings work involves a nonprofit partnership in Peru called The Light and Leadership Initiative focused on leadership. Uneath the World had a small group of associates from advertising agency Leo Burnett looking for an experience. The nonprofit was launching a fair trade brand but didn’t know how to market. Uneath the World sent four Leo Burnett professionals to Peru, where they spent two weeks building a strategy to help them launch the brand.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, Uneath the World, like many other organi-

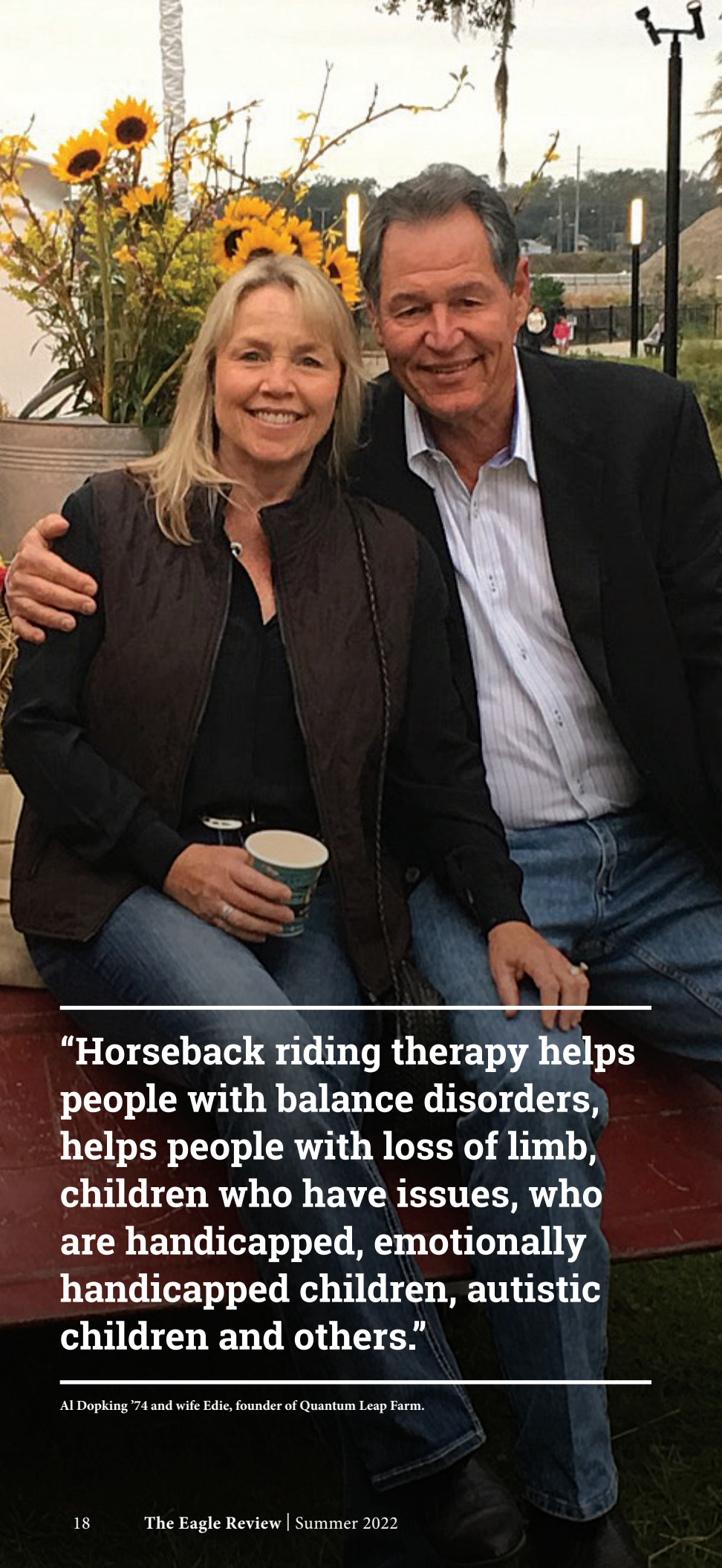
zations, was forced to pivot its efforts. The company was built on the traveling piece, but schools and businesses weren’t letting people travel anymore.

“These are grassroots nonprofits and they needed to completely focus on everything related to their program, as opposed to hosting visitors,” Kathryn explained. “Some of our partners were able to pivot relatively quickly and start doing virtual and online opportunities, but so much of the experience is being there with the culture.”

Kathryn and Mike were able to shift their focus to supporting their nonprofits financially, but recently decided to take a pause on Uneath the World after more than nine years. But it isn’t the end—the Piscos are reimagining how things look, now a family with three young children in Scituate, Massachusetts. As they look to rebuild, Kathryn shared they’ll keep elements so it is still service driven and grassroots, but will also take into account the virtual piece.

“We’ve worked with 1,000 people in Uneath the World’s existence,” she said. “The majority of these people say this was transformative and now I look at the world differently.”

DOPKING'S LEAP TO HELP VETS, DISABLED

Several factors play into Al Dopking's involvement at Quantum Leap Farm, a horseback riding therapy program in Odessa, Fla. The number one reason he got involved and stays involved is his wife, Edie, who started the program on their 10-acre property.

"She's from Kentucky, an avid equestrian, and after selling a business she co-owned she decided to do something with horses and business together," said Dopking '74. "She created a non-profit in 2000 and I've been a perpetual board member ever since."

Quantum Leap Farm's goal is to help spark growth in individuals with physical, emotional and intellectual differences and empower them to focus on their abilities.

"Horseback riding therapy helps people with balance disorders, helps people with loss of limb, children who have issues, who are handicapped, emotionally handicapped children, autistic children and others," said Dopking, who was Manager of Citi's Southeast Municipal Trading and Underwriting Desk when Edie started Quantum Leap Farm (QLF) 22 years ago.

At the time, he assisted with anything and everything to help the farm get started and help it gain momentum.

"In the early days we did it all," said Dopking. "I was a side walker, I shoveled stalls. Now it's a 1.7 million dollar operation. I've seen this grow and I appreciate what Edie has done and so I stay involved because it's something I've seen created and I want to see do well. I'm sort of in the role of supportive spouse."

Dopking currently serves on the QLF finance committee, and the Horseplay Charity Golf Invitational committee.

"When you're on a nonprofit board, you have to find a committee that you want to get into

the weeds with, so those are the two committees of my focus,” he said Finance and fundraising are a good fit for Dopking, who is currently a Fixed Income Specialist for Suncoast Equity Management in Tampa.

Dopking played baseball at St. Louis University, where he majored in finance, and spent summers interning at The Ohio Company in Columbus. He had plans to go to law school and after graduating worked in the Ohio Secretary of State’s office for several years but then decided finance was his preferred field.

While at the Secretary of State’s office he joined the Air Force Reserves and served for 15 years, from 1979-94. He was assigned to a Rapid Runway Repair unit attached to Rickenbacker Air National Guard Base.

“While I was in the reserves Desert Storm occurred in 1991 and I knew people that went to Desert Storm,” Dopking said. “That was probably one of the first major military efforts since Vietnam. It was not a long conflict, but the people came back and they were different. Post traumatic stress disorder was not a thing at that time but then once we went to Afghanistan and Iraq after 9/11 it came to the forefront. I felt these guys really needed some help.”

Quantum Leap Farm provides therapeutic riding and occupational therapy programs for children and adults with physical or mental disabilities. It also offers a variety of programs for veterans and their families, including therapeutic riding, retreats and family fun days. Dopking said they serve about 1,500 people per year with approximately 60 percent of them veterans.

The Dopkings have three children: Beth, Christie and Nathan. It was with Christie, who is developmentally disabled, that Dopking became a side walker at QLF.

On Saturday mornings, while Dopking was in the ring with Christie, a veteran named Mark Lalli would also be there. Lalli is a U.S. Army veteran who was one of five out of 11 passengers who survived a helicopter crash during a training exercise.

“His rehabilitation, the amount of surgeries and time in the hospital was unbelievable,” said Dopking. “He was able to sit on a horse

and was getting both physical therapy and working with the mental health counselors on staff. He would come out Saturday mornings when I was out with my daughter and I would be involved with him and talk with him and being a veteran, I sympathize with his situation. We formed a bond.

“Mark started making improvements where he could stand and he had a volunteer helper, Margo, who was from, of all places, Westerville, Ohio and we had a common interest as big Ohio State fans. She would help him and push him to walk and they really hit it off. Then he finally got the courage to ask her out. They ended up getting married with their wedding at Quantum Leap Farm in the riding arena and to surprise her he walked down the aisle all the way. He practiced this for months. He worked up to this and it was very emotional.”

Dopking said the couple has been married for about 7 years and has three kids, a happy ending story he enjoyed telling. It is the stories like this that fuel his passion to support his wife’s efforts with Quantum Leap Farm.

“It’s quite amazing what they do at the farm.”

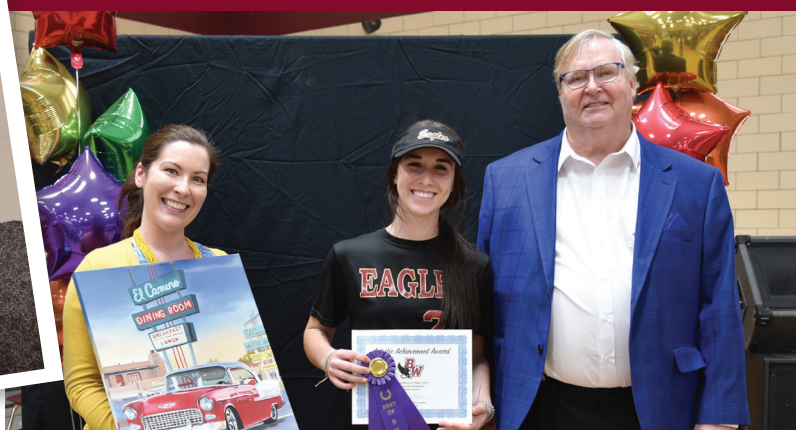
on life, and I am so excited to embrace this beauty more fully in my English curriculum and instruction."
